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Presenting Images in Collage

ADDINGTON THE

A collage is a collection or combination of different materials or photographs stuck onto a backing. These could be a variety of different images or just found images of colours used to create a new image.




Nancy Standlee creates collages using found colours in magazines and rips them to make a new image.



Jennifer Collier uses different found papers and objects to create a collection. She combines ripping and cutting with stitch.

Alison Diaz cuts straight slices of photographs and collages them together with a weaving technique.

Task 1: Recreate 3 examples of collage

You can use found magazine or printed images. Think about cutting, rupping, mounting, cutting images into **shapes** or to create something new. If you run out of space, stick an extra page in your booklet.

Creating colour gradient with




Collage is a really useful technique that can be used to create completely new images. Using found images and <u>ripping or cutting</u> small sections of Colour you can create <u>depth and tone</u>. Have a look at some examples by Patrick Bremer or Nancy Standlee online or in the shared area to see how they use colour.

By using a <u>variety of shades and tones</u> of colour you can create the impression of a **3D image.**


<u>Task 1:</u> Using **coloured pencil crayons** blend from red to yellow in the gradient bar below.

<u>Remember your colour mixing you practiced</u>
<u>last year!</u> Start with red and graduate through orange until you get to yellow. Use the rectangles as a guide to help you.





<u>Task 2:</u> Using the same idea as above, create a **colour gradient** from **yellow** to **blue** using **collage**. Collect the colours from **magazines** and printed images and **stick them down**. You will need to blend from yellow to green to blue. Use the rectangles as a guide to help you. Remember to overlap your collaged pieces to fill the space.




 $Yellow \longrightarrow Blue$

Photomontage

Photomontage is a collage technique that can <u>be produced by hand or on the computer</u> using programs such as Adobe Photoshop. This technique uses **images as a whole** and combines them to **make a new scene**.

The artist **Martina Lopez** creates photomontage images by **placing people in new scenes**. She mixes old **black and white photographs** with new **colour images** of fantastical scenes.



Decoupage,





Decoupage is the art of decorating objects using paper cutouts. Essentially, it's like applying a collage onto a 3D object.

Look at the examples above of the artist **Magie Hollingworth** who uses kitchen utensils.

Task 1: Create your own collage on a found object, this could be any small recyclable object, such as an old kitchen utensil or food packaging. Make your collage relevant to the object (eg. food related images or words).

Stick the object in the box on the right.

If the object is too big, take a photograph and stick it in - make sure to bring your object in to school though!

Origami






Origami is the ancient practice of **paper folding** which is often associated with *Japanese* culture, although has been used by many different people around the world.

Artist **Jennifer Collier** uses <u>recycled papers</u> to create origami clothing.

<u>Task 1:</u> Make a **small origami sculpture** using recycled materials. This could be an item of clothing or food.
